The expat and his wife had struck up a conversation with a local woman during their return flight from Dubai. Arriving safely at the desired destination the driver and his sidekick proudly declared that the fee was 4,000 tenge (around \$29). Now let me see here – 4000 divided by 100 is 40 kilometers. Is it <u>REALY</u> 40 kilometers from the airport to Abai, near to the Smak store area??? Wow, I have traveled a similar route and it sure did not seem like 40 kilometers. But I could be wrong, I'm not from here you know and the expat in question was told the same – he is not from here and does not understand. It is amazing sometimes just how stupid we expats are. It is a wonder we know how to breath! Now the expats wife and their guest are both local residents and both were shocked by this situation to the point of being speechless.

The expat explained he did not have 4,000 to give. He showed the second man of the driving duo what he did have (big mistake!). The man grabbed all his money ran to the car and got in. The driver hastily wrote a receipt (why, no one really knows) and threw it at the expat – they drove away in great haste.
